Respect inner brick circle. • Loose clothing and long hair to be secured back • All materials collected before fire lit. • Fire lit by adults only or with very close supervision • Fire put out with a bucket of water (Staff should have a copy of the bonfire guidelines - separate sheet in fire resources.) • Water bucket, first aid kit and fire extinguisher present in shelter (near fire area) • High staff : pupil ratio • Warning of hot marshmallows – given biscuit to eat them with and/or allow appropriate cooling time (demo given). • Awareness of weather conditions • Verbal warning when out collecting wood with regards to steep, uneven ground. • Children not left unsupervised with a lit fire. • Food allergies to be known before session and to be catered for. • Consider wind direction and strength when seating groups around fire. • Fire extinguished correctly and fire is made safe after use.
